2025 Challenge Grant Awards



FoKL Challenge Grants provide matching funds to help Friends groups launch projects that support their local libraries. Congratulations to the following grant winners:

Enterprise Public Library - will use grant monies to purchase food and equipment for cooking classes for youth in the community. The Library held a demo class to test interest in the program, and reported that there was so much enthusiasm that they expect they will need to hold multiple classes for different age groups. Some equipment has already been purchased for the project, a teacher has designed a curriculum, and all is ready to go once the remaining equipment is in place.

This project is being carried out in memory of former librarian Joan Phillips, who passed away in November, 2024. Joan initiated the project, and the current librarian said they hope to continue it to honor Joanie "and everything she did to make this place for the kids."

Friends of the Frankfort City Library - to support the purchase of Wonderbooks for the library's children's book collection. Wonderbooks are traditional print books with a built-in audio component that reads the story aloud to the child. This "read-along" experience promotes literacy by helping children follow along with the text, hear proper pronunciation, and develop fluency and comprehension skills — all while fostering a love of reading. **Friends of Johnson County Library** - to expand their book giveaway activities into the 2025-2026 school year. The group will give \$100 Friends Book Sale gift cards to Title 1 elementary school librarians in a project that enhances the Library's mission to provide equal and ready access to books and information to all in the community. The project also helps foster a love of reading for future generations.

Friends of the Vermillion Community, Inc. - for the purchase of materials to create painted plywood displays featuring pictures of animals with holes cut out where children can have their pictures taken. The displays will be stationed in the area of the town's Story Walk. The art project will be part of the Vermillion Public Library's summer program "Color our World."

Start-up Grant

FoKL awarded a Start-up Grant to the Ellis Pubic Library, who is reviving a Friends group that has been inactive for a number of years.

The Ellis group has already found a great deal of interest in the community. A team has been working to reactivate their non-profit status, elect officers, and they are currently revising their bylaws.

The Ellis Friends recently held an open house at the library, which attracted new members, and will host a bunco party in June.

The grant monies will be used to send thank you cards for donations, and to make flyers and a brochure to promote the group. Good luck to the Ellis Friends!

Kansas Libraries Need YOUR Help!



Join the Friends of Kansas Libraries (FOKL) in advocating for IMLS funding to protect our libraries!

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), the primary federal agency supporting libraries and museums, is facing significant funding cuts due to an executive order issued on March 14, 2025. The order directs the agency to reduce staffing and services and prevents new budget requests unless they are necessary for shutting down the agency.

In response to a lawsuit filed by the American Library Association (ALA) and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), federal courts have blocked the executive order aimed to dismantle IMLS and other agencies and ruled that the order violates the Constitution's separation of powers clause.

These rulings temporarily secure IMLS funding for 2025, but the agency and funding for Kansas libraries remain at risk. While 2025 funding has already been distributed, the executive order could lead to major budget shortfalls starting in 2026.

How would this impact your library and your community?

Kansas libraries rely heavily on IMLS funding, which accounts for around 30% of the State Library of Kansas's budget. In 2024, Kansas received \$2.1 million in federal funding through IMLS, supporting essential services Kansas libraries such as:

- Interlibrary Loan Services Allowing all types of libraries across the state to share resources. The most recent Kansas Public Library Survey shows that 735,519 items were shared among school, academic, public and special libraries.
- Summer Reading Programs Funding for partial support of this annual program that fosters literacy and learning for children.

- Database Access Including resources like the Britannica encyclopedias for all ages, Nursing and Allied Health and a number of educational and research resources for use by all types of Kansas libraries and every Kansas resident.
- Talking Books Providing access to more than 131,000 books to Kansas residents with visual or other impairments that make using traditional print difficult or impossible.

What would it mean to you, your neighbors, schools and communities if these services were not available? The cost effectiveness for Kansans with the small investment of federal funds is clear from the facts provided at <u>https://kslibassoc.org/KLA_News</u>.

What You Can Do

While IMLS funding and operations are temporarily protected, the injunction does not guarantee long-term funding. Congress must still approve the FY 2026 budget, which will determine whether IMLS funding continues beyond September 30, 2025. Unless members of Congress demand library funding, the proposed White House budget will eliminate the IMLS and the library services we freely enjoy.

Advocacy efforts from library Friends and library supporters are critical, and time is growing short. Take action **now** to preserve funding and services. The American Library Association has made it easy by providing contact information and information you need to reach your legislators. Your personal story or experience is also key to demonstrating the impact libraries have on Kansas communities and residents. Advocate for continued IMLS funding and oppose any measures that threaten library resources.


Hays Public Library Completes Basement Remodel

The Hays Public Library held a ribbon cutting on Friday, May 16, 2025, to celebrate the conclusion of a project to remodel the basement. The entire lower level now has updated ceilings, lighting, and flooring. The northern half houses the main adult collection, which was rearranged to open the space. Seating and electrical outlets were added to create a welcoming area to study, work, or read.

One element of the project updated staff offices and relocated the Cataloging and Interlibrary Loan offices into a larger space to better serve staff needs. The total cost of the project was approximately \$527,000.

The Kansas Room, in the south end of the basement, holds an extensive collection of books and other resources about Kansas, the Great Plains and the American West. Improvements to this space were completely covered by the fundraising efforts of the Hays Public Library Foundation. The \$175,000 upgrade included lighting, flooring, and furniture to better display the collection and to make the room more hospitable for presentations and gatherings.
