Friends Bring the Fun Outdoors with New Library Patio

At the Lansing Community Library, the Friends of the Library have once again proven that big things happen when passionate people roll up their sleeves and dream a little bigger. This summer, they led the charge on a brand-new outdoor patio—transforming an underused patch of ground into a vibrant space designed for connection, creativity, and community.

With a total cost of \$10,000, the project was powered by a strong partnership between the Friends (who generously covered half the cost) and a development grant awarded to the Library after

achieving regional accreditation through NEKLS. The patio was completed by mid-summer and has already become a favorite spot for patrons and staff alike. It's a shining example of what's possible when a Friends group brings vision, heart, and hustle to the table.

This cheerful new space is ready to make storytimes extra magical, giving book clubs a breezy place to gather, and offering the perfect backdrop for outreach programs, author visits, and all kinds of hands-on activities. Even the Library team has been spotted enjoying a break or brainstorming new ideas out in the fresh air.

And the fun is just beginning! The Library is planning everything from poetry nights and garden-themed learning events to cozy fall storytimes and multigenerational hangouts under the sky. Whenever the weather cooperates, the patio will be buzzing with activity—bringing people together in creative ways and helping the Library stretch beyond its walls.



Wichita Friends Selling New Items to Promote Library Support



Looking for a conversation starter about how to support your local library? Friends of the Wichita Public Library (FWPL) began selling \$20 yard signs in July to stimulate more love for their libraries. The red signs were designed by Wichita Library Communication Specialist David Garcia to encourage community members to advocate, volunteer and donate.

The signs are popping up all over town and stimulating conversations among neighbors about library updates and services. FWPL Board member Angie Prather said her neighbors immediately noticed her library advocacy yard sign and one of them shared that her last visit to the library was during Covid. She was unaware that the main library had moved to its new location in 2018 and that other branches were being updated.


Prather said, "The signage provided an easy opportunity for us to chat about all the positive changes that have taken place in the last few years. I texted her the new address for the main library and told her about the benefits of the used bookstore. She plans to visit some library locations with her grandchildren. The conversation probably wouldn't have happened without the prompt provided by the yard sign."

FWPL has sold 33 signs since they became available in July. Branded and reusable tote bags were also introduced in July. The red bags sell for \$5 each and can be used at the upcoming November 15 used book sale. Bags can be filled at the sale with used books for an additional \$5.

Both items are available at the FWPL used bookstore located inside the Advanced Learning Library (711 W. Second Street N). They're also being offered at branch reopening celebrations and other special events.


