We recently asked some board members a few questions . . .

What drew you to working on the FoKL board?

Dalton Torneden (Eudora): FOKL does a lot of great things to support groups across the state of Kansas -- from assisting new Friends groups with getting started to grants to advocacy.

As a member of my local Friends group during the Pandemic, I can say that the First Friday Zooms were and are a great way to connect with others across the state to talk about ideas and to learn from one another. Stronger together is always better. Having positive experiences with FOKL and feeling energized by its purpose, I wanted to give back to an organization who supported me and others during a challenging time.

Jan Schmidt (Salina): I wanted to learn what other Friends groups in Kansas were doing. What fund raising events did they sponsor, for example. I wanted to be part of a great organization and learn all about Friend groups.

Cheryl Sylvester (Perry): I have worked with Friends groups in each of the six libraries I have worked at. I feel strongly that Friends need other Friends. FOKL provides the opportunity for local groups across the state to learn from each other and receive support. Various commitments made me step away for a few years, but being able to rejoin the group just re-enforced in me how important education, support and assistance are for local groups to have someplace to turn to. Libraries have systems, Friends have FOKL.

Susie Scott (Wichita): Melissa Wilson, the Friends Operations Manager, encouraged me to get involved with FOKL in order to represent the Wichita Friends of the Wichita Public Library. I love learning what other Friends groups are doing.



What is your favorite part of serving on the FoKL board?

Carolyn Little (Topeka): I've found that my friends are often the source of good advice. The same is true with Friends groups who share ideas during First Friday with Friends. These monthly meetings (with occasional breaks) highlight an activity and/or a featured guest who offers tips on timely topics. I welcome suggestions for future First Fridays and invite you to add your spark to one of my favorite FoKL programs!

Barb Mathews (Eudora): After retiring from working at the Baldwin Public Library, I joined FoKL to stay active in the library world. It is easy to get so engrossed in one's own library world. Being on the FoKL Board has given me a wider and very interesting look at the public libraries throughout the state. I have really enjoyed visiting other Kansas public libraries and sharing ideas. I strongly believe in the mission of public libraries and FoKL is a strong contributor to their growth.

Sheryl Erickson (Winfield): I enjoy getting to visit libraries across Kansas in person and meeting and talking with Friends and librarians during FoKL First Fridays and at other meetings/conferences.

Susan Bryant (Robinson): Of course the annual grant and award giving is my very favorite, but I also love traveling around Kansas and visiting other libraries when the board meets

in person. It's wonderful to see these beautiful facilities and meet their enthusiastic and accomplished staff. It gives me a great deal of pride to know how important home-town libraries are to their Kansas communities.

Could you share your "elevator speech" about why libraries are important?

Carolyn: A library is the most democratic of institutions. The people who work in them educate, inspire, and respond to requests for information. When you need answers, go to the library!

Dalton: Libraries are important because they can serve as a community's connecting point. It's the one place people of all types and interests can go to connect, learn and grow. A public library has something for everyone and is often one of the few places in a community where there is little or no expectation of payment.

Susie: I am a life-long user of the library and appreciate the value and diversity of library collections. I am also amazed at the variety of programs and services that many libraries are able to offer; cool/warm place to be, computers and internet access, programs, training, and so much more!

Focus on the FoKL Board - continued

What is the most fun or unusual project your local Friends group has done?

Sheryl: For a hauntingly different Friends book discussion we had an after-hours session by candlelight. The book was set in England in the 1800's and is about a mother and daughter who are fine-work seamstresses. After the mother is sent to the poorhouse, the daughter finds she has the power to stitch misfortune into the garments she makes in retaliation for hers and her mother's mistreatment. During the event we moved around to different table activities and had some enchanted refreshments.

Susie: This summer our Friends group is handing out ice cream sandwiches at each branch on a Saturday afternoon. It has been pretty fun visiting with library patrons and giving them an ice cream sandwich.

What is one thing you wish everyone knew about libraries (or Friends of the Library)?

Christy Molzen (Newton): I wish everyone knew that libraries have so much more to offer than just books (even though the books will always be my favorite part). Libraries are the center of their communities, providing resources to all ages and interests. They are that essential "third place" where people can go and spend time without being expected to buy anything. They offer job hunting resources, Wi-Fi and computer access, after-school programs, study rooms, and a variety of events and programming that bring community members together. When I first moved to Newton, the library was the first place I went to meet people and make new friends. I've participated in book clubs, attended lectures, played scrabble and trivia, and can't wait to try speed puzzling.

Cheryl: I wish everyone realized how much value a library adds to the quality of life in a community. Libraries have limited resources but provide books, movies and computers for lifelong learning, plus programs for all ages all for free in a safe environment.

Dalton: That a well-funded and well-supported library can be your community's greatest asset.

Susie: Our communities need libraries and they have to be funded. I worry too many people don't realize how necessary it is to fund their local library.

Do you have any advice to give communities who want to start a Friends group?

Jan: Selecting your board of Directors is not done lightly. This is one of the most important decisions your organization makes. The board is responsible for fundraising, finances, governance, IRS reports, State Reports and many other things.

Tips for recruiting effective and productive board of directors:

- Board members and officers must contribute significant time and personal resources to the organization. They must also be willing to assume the legal and ethical duties of the leadership role.
- Board members are expected to serve as volunteers.
- Board members are also expected to make an annual financial gift. Much of the supplies, pencils, labels, etc., are provided by the board members.
- Board members are expected to help two to four hours a week at sorting books for book sales, helping to stock books on the sales shelves, and any other duties as directed,

So many duties and you learn many as you go. Your FoKL board is always available to contact for assistance.

Dalton: Find a connecting person or people in your community. Often this person has a mental rolodex that can be utilized to at the very least help you form your core group. Having someone like this is invaluable.

Barb: Find a group of 5 or 6 dedicated people. Ask the library what they need/want for their children's section. Set a specific goal (kid-size chairs, more picture books, kid-appropriate learning tech, etc.) and know the cost. Pick a fundraiser (bake sale, auction, bingo night, etc.) and crank up the publicity. Emphasize that it is for the LOCAL CHILDREN. Use this as a foundation event to get the ball rolling on getting your group organized going forward.

Susie: Be patient; it doesn't happen overnight.
